

Truth and Mercy series II

It is nearly impossible to live life without communication. Communication has taken on a new dimension even in our lives that both verbal and non-verbal aspects of it are needed for meaningful relationships. One reason the pandemic was such a painful and stressful time. It even led to lots of anxiety and fear in the land and globally. Family networks were disrupted, groups of friends could not socialize, students and friends could hang out with each other, churches and prayers in common could not hold.

The need for communication cannot be over-emphasized. God Our Father is the prime communicator. He desires regular communication and dialogue with us His children. He has been in the business of communicating with us since time immemorial. He communicated through the Patriarchs, Abraham, Moses, the Judges, the Prophets. These were in a bid to establish a relationship with us. At various times this dialogue was fraught with challenges. For example having given His people the 10 Commandments, the people failed at some points to keep the tenets of the relationship. At such times, there were consequences, sanctions and punishments. Sometimes it was a loss of battle with their enemies that made it clear to the people they had sinned. The reason for the commandments was not to gag the people or restrict them but so that they may have abundant live with the Lord. It was akin to giving someone the manual for optimal use of a device, computer, car, television or the like. Once the buyer does not utilize the manual, the device malfunctions. The ten Commandments were God's holy manual for us to maintain our life under His loving care and be free from the hands of our enemies (the devil and his surrogates). The commandments were truly to set us free to love God and our neighbor.

The fullest expression of God's public communication with humanity is through His Son, Jesus Christ: "The Word made flesh" (John 1: 14). The whole plan and mission of God the Father was visibly expressed in Him and through Him. He is the One John says, "That which was from the beginning, which we have heard. which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked upon and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life, the life was made manifest, and we saw it, and testify to it, and proclaim to you the eternal life which was with the Father and was made manifest to us..." 
Saint of the Week


St. Henry | July 13

Saint Henry was born in 972 to Henry, Duke of Bavaria, Germany, and his wife Gisela of Burgundy. Saint Henry's early life was permeated with Christianity, among those who guided his education was Bishop Wolfgang of Ratisbon, who became a saint himself. In 995, Saint Henry succeeded his father as Duke of Bavaria, and in 1002, upon the death of his cousin, Otho III, he was elected emperor. In 1014, Saint Henry undertook the long journey from Germany to Rome to be crowned Holy Roman Emperor by Pope Benedict XIII. In 1022 Saint Henry assisted Pope Benedict VIII in holding the Council of Pavia, which promoted clerical celibacy and sought to end simony (the buying and selling of ecclesiastical goods and offices). During his reign, Saint Henry used his wealth and position for the Church. He confirmed Benedict's authority over Rome, was a patron of churches and monasteries, supported the Cluniac Reforms, restored episcopal sees, and founded the Diocese of Bamburg where he built a cathedral.

Saint Henry was married to Cunigunde of Luxembourg, to whom he was incredibly devoted. Although disputed by some historians, some stories of the couple's marriage report they took vows of chastity because their union was childless. Saint Henry died in July of 1024 and was canonized in 1146 by Pope Eugene III.
